Ale bowl carving with Dave Refsal

We had a great time carving ale bowls with Dave Refsal, lots of laughs and lots of fun. They come in every size, shape and design. Dave has done a lot of them and is very knowledgeable on the subject.

The drinking bowl, known as a *kjenge*, originates from Norway. The horse or dragon shape that makes up the two handles is a fertility symbol in Norway. The bowl would have been passed around at a celebration to drink out of. It was carved from a single piece of burl wood. The painting technique is known as *rosemaling*, a traditional form of decorative folk art. Ale bowls usually stayed with the house or farm where they were made.

We had two new members join during this class. They were Jeff Scholl and Charles(CB) Kloos. Glad to have you carving with us.

When we started our web page, about 5 years ago, we were hoping it would help get us noticed. Just recently I looked at the number of hits we are getting on our webpage. For the past 12 months we had 1,111 hits and in the past month we had 136 hits. It is doing what we had hoped for. The only negative is that I received emails from people inquiring what our business hours were so they could stop by and looking at the carvings. In addition to our webpage we have a newsletter that goes out each month to 97 people.
